Pilgrims of Hope with Mary's Meals

Mary's Meals provides school meals to more than 2.4 million children living in some of the world's poorest countries. These meals are a great source of hope for children, their families and local communities, attracting children into the classroom and giving them energy to learn and opportunities for a better future for the next generation.

Mary's Meals is named after Mary, the mother of Jesus, who brought up her own child in poverty. We consist of, respect, and reach out to people of all faiths and none.

This resource introduces the work of Mary's Meals and helps students explore the idea of hope and the theme of this Jubilee Year. It also provides opportunities and ideas for them to become pilgrims of hope, by praying for our work, sharing it with others, and raising funds to support the children we feed.

What is a jubilee?



What is a jubilee? Which jubilees have you heard of?

The origin of the Christian Jubilee goes back to biblical times. The Law of Moses prescribed a special year for the Jewish people: "You shall hallow the fiftieth year and proclaim the liberty throughout the land, to all its inhabitants; it shall be a jubilee for you when each of you shall return to his property and each of you shall return to his family. This fiftieth year is to be a jubilee year for you: you will not sow, you will not harvest the ungathered corn, you will not gather the untrimmed vine. The jubilee is to be a holy thing to you, you will eat what comes from the fields." (Leviticus 25:10-14)

The trumpet with which this particular year was announced was a goat's horn called Yobel in Hebrew, and the origin of the word jubilee.

The celebration of this year also included the restitution of land to the original owners, the remission of debts, the liberation of slaves and the land was left fallow. In the New Testament, Jesus presents himself as the One who brings the old jubilee to completion, because he has come to "preach the year of the Lord's favour" (Isaiah 61: 1-2).

Transformative economics

Notice how transformative this explanation is:

- People got their land back (if they'd lost it by going into debt, for example).
- Enslaved people were freed.
- The land was allowed to recover for a year (just as the people, who lived really hard lives, had a chance to recover).

Taking it further

Read these quotations from Spes Non Confundit (Hope Does Not Disappoint) by Pope Francis:

- "Echoing the age-old message of the prophets, the jubilee reminds us that the goods
 of the earth are not destined for a privileged few, but for everyone. The rich must be
 generous and not avert their eyes from the faces of their brothers and sisters in need.
 Here I think especially of those who lack water and food: hunger is a scandal, an open
 wound on the body of our humanity, and it summons all of us to a serious examination of
 conscience."
- "I renew my appeal that 'with the money spent on weapons and other military
 expenditures, let us establish a global fund that can finally put an end to hunger and
 favour development in the most impoverished countries, so that their citizens will not
 resort to violent or illusory situations, or have to leave their countries in order to seek a
 more dignified life."
- "If we really wish to prepare a path to peace in our world, let us commit ourselves to remedying the remote causes of injustice, settling unjust and unpayable debts, and feeding the hungry."

School + Food = Hope

The motto of the 2025 Jubilee is Pilgrims of Hope. Hope is a really important word for Mary's Meals. Our message in a nutshell is School + Food = Hope.

Today, it is estimated that 67 million primary school-age children are out of school. Instead of sitting in a classroom and gaining an education that could change their situation, they could be working or begging in an effort to survive. Millions more attend school so hungry that they are not able to concentrate and learn.

Mary's Meals' vision is that every child receives one daily meal in their place of education and that all those who have more than they need, share with those who lack even the most basic things. Working together with people who share our vision, we believe that it can be achieved in this world where there is enough food for everyone.

We firmly believe that the children who receive Mary's Meals today can one day grow up, well-nourished and well-educated, to become the men and women who will lift their communities out of poverty. We call them 'Generation Hope'.

Let's get moving

In the 13th century there was great suffering, caused by wars and diseases such as the plague: among the people there was a great desire to return to a more holy way of living. So, with great faith, many Christians travelled (on foot) to Rome, to pray at the tombs of the Apostles Peter and Paul and to receive the Pope's blessing, in order to obtain the grace and strength to carry on. They came in their thousands at Christmas in 1299. Due to their great number, Pope Boniface VII, having enquired and learned the reason for their coming, and full of admiration for their faith, proclaimed AD 1300 a "year of forgiveness of all sins." It was the first ordinary jubilee.

Pilgrimages have become a key feature of jubilees since the beginning. There is a deep human need to step away from the ordinary frustrations of life and to reset by simply getting on our feet and moving. Pilgrimages are one way of doing this.

- They bring people together.
- They give them a common purpose.
- They provide inspiring examples.

As Pope Francis has pointed out, "the Christian life is a journey calling for moments of greater intensity to encourage and sustain hope as the constant companion that guides our steps." (Spes Non Confundit, 5)

He also reminds us that, "Setting out on a journey is traditionally associated with our human quest for meaning in life."

Save the date: Pray in May

You can support Mary's Meals in prayer throughout the year, but many supporters make a special effort to pray during the month of May, which is dedicated to Our Lady, after whom Mary's Meals was named. Give hope

Raising funds for Mary's Meals is a powerful way to give hope to hungry children around the world. It costs just 10p a day to feed a child with Mary's Meals at school, and £19.15 to feed a child for a whole school year, so your class can make a powerful and measurable impact.

Porridge party

'Porridge' is the school meal we serve to children in Malawi, Zambia and Zimbabwe. Made from a vitamin-enriched corn soya blend this nutritious meal feeds more than 1.5 million children every school day, helping them to learn and grow.

An enterprising approach

Focusing on the skills and talents that you have. What could you make or bake to sell for Mary's Meals? Could you put on a show or event?



You could brainstorm ideas as a whole class or in small groups.

You may each want to take a different area of responsibility, such as budgeting, planning, marketing and production.

However much you raise, together you will make a huge difference to children living in poverty. Count the profit and then work out how many children you are providing with a daily school meal. When paying in the funds raised, you can request a certificate to celebrate what you have achieved.


