She enjoys school and excels in reading and writing Hindi, as well as drawing and colouring. She dreams of becoming a police officer and believes the meals help her focus. She says: "When we eat, the brain works well."

The youngest of seven siblings, Gabriel is committed to finishing his education and becoming a teacher. But it hasn't always been easy for him to attend school. When he first started, there was no feeding programme.

I was always hungry. Now, my stomach is full and I can fully participate in class.

During the harvest season, Gabriel's parents have often needed him to work on the family farm but knowing that he'll have a meal at school is an incentive for them to prioritise his education. Gabriel continues: "I feel bad when I miss school. School is a good thing and when you get educated, you can lead a better life."
